
The New Hopkinton Public Library

- ➤ We seek approval tonight to borrow \$11.75 million to fund construction of the new Hopkinton Public Library
- This article is the culmination of 3+ years of work by the Town and dedicated volunteers
- The timing for this article is driven by a number of positive developments
 - The state is expected to grant us \$4.5 million at the beginning of the new fiscal year
 - ♦ HPLF has raised \$450,000 to date to offset costs four months into a 4-year capital campaign

Key milestones for Hopkinton Library

- ▶1895 Hopkinton Public Library first opened
- ➤ 1967 Last renovation & expansion of Hopkinton Library
 Brought our library to current size of 5,700 square feet






Planning for a new Library - Needs for Hopkinton

- > 2000 Purchase of 9 Church Street for future expansion
- ➤ 2008 Input from community determined needs in Library Building Program
 - 1. <u>Lack of Space</u> lack of space for collections, equipment, programs & seating
 - 2. <u>Infrastructure</u> antique building unable to keep up with new advancements in technology
 - 3. Lack of Accessibility
 - 4. Lack of Parking
- ≥2010-2011 PBC begins oversight of project
- ➤ 2012 PBC Report –\$1.1 million for repair and maintenance; still insufficient to meet town service needs

Has Library use changed in the "Digital Age"?

> 3 Ways our community uses library resources:

Education - Borrowing benefits adults, teens & children Access to Technology - Education, Entertainment & Professional Place of Civic Engagement - Attend programs & use meeting space

- Library use continues to increase both in MA and nationwide national circulation up 26% in last 10 years
- ➤ Hopkinton similar: library usage statistics from 2008-2013 show


Circulation (borrowing) **INCREASED 28%**Computer use at the library **INCREASED 43%**Attendance at programs **INCREASED 80%**

► A new library can:

Serve as the intellectual and social hub of the community **Re-engage** many residents who currently use other libraries **Enhance** the economic vitality of downtown

Construction and Operating Costs

\$11./5 million	Total Project Cost
\$4.5 million	MBLC State Grant Reimbursement
\$1 million	Private Fundraising

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\$6.25 million Remaining Town Cost

- The \$6.25 million represents \$95 in year 1 for an average home Decreasing each year over the 20 year bond to \$55/year average
- Annual building operating costs will increase by \$100k
- Staffing costs will increase over time to meet the service goals of the community anticipate \$75-100k total over several years
- Our current Library spending is 2nd lowest of 103 communities our size and 26th lowest overall in MA; less than 1% of total town budget



Approval and Construction Process

- The Hopkinton Permanent Building Committee will oversee design, approval and construction processes volunteers with experience in construction
- The approval process for this project will be **exactly the same** as for any public or private building project in Hopkinton
- The community will have numerous additional opportunities for involvement during the approval process, including:
 - ❖Zoning Board of Appeals
 - ❖Planning Board
 - Historic District Commission
 - Historical Commission
 - **❖**DPW
 - **❖**Town staff



Approval and Construction Process

Expected Timing:

May 2014 Approval at ATM and Town Election

July 2014: \$4.5 million state grant issued

June - Dec. 2014: Design Refinement and Town Approvals

Jan. 2015 - Aug. 2015: Construction Planning and Bidding

September 2015: Temporary Library Relocation

Oct. 2015 - Nov. 2016: Construction

December 2016: New Library Opens!



Parking

- Over 110 parking spaces currently exist within 500 feet of the library
- The new building will include 21 parking spaces
- All current parking locations downtown will continue to provide access
- Most larger events will be off-hours and so will not compete with midday access to parking
- Since 2009, 4 Special Permits have been requested to mitigate downtown parking requirements and all have been approved
- We must acknowledge that keeping the library in the center of town is important and will require some tradeoffs



Special Permits Issued for Parking

- ➤ Baypath Plaza (14 Main St) **Special Permit approved 2009** providing additional parking on Main St.
- ➤ Zios/Main St. Ventures (15 Main St) **Special Permit approved 2009** providing additional parking on Main St.
- ➤ HCA (98 Hayden Rowe) **Special Permit approved 2013** providing additional off-site parking on Hayden Rowe
- Legacy Farms (0 East Main) Special Permit approved 2014 reducing parking requirement for retirement residence
- No Special Permit requests for parking have been denied in at least 5 years
